Appeal – do you have English Dictionaries you'd be happy to donate?

Many years ago the Addington Primary School generously allowed an organisation called "Talk English" to run English classes for refugees that had settled in Durban from throughout the continent of Africa. These classes were dynamic.

Talk English was born on the 15th August 2005 after a Durban CELTA course. As with CELTA generally, students became a close-knit group of all ages, from various occupations.

The 20 French-speaking teaching-practice students from DRC included 6 medical professionals (3 doctors, 1 nurse, 2 third year medical students), 2 engineers, a maths teacher and several other professionals and graduates. Most had work experience but none could practice their profession or trade because all were beginner or low level English speakers: a Lingua Franca in South Africa, vital for work and survival in the port city of Durban.

One young man who optimised his time and the English classes was Papy Kalaba Ontafia. Papy is now back in his homeland of the DRC and has started The English Club to share his knowledge of English with the youth in his region. Papy has reached out to our Rotary E-Club asking for English dictionaries to assist the youth in The English Club.

Our visit to Raiatea, Society Islands – French Polynesia by Viktor Cytra



Although this was our first visit to this island we decided not to take an organized tour as our ship was docked in the downtown area. We explored the town on our own. We visited a beautiful Catholic Church and while roaming with the iPhone video Elizabeth came across an interesting café. When we took a look inside, we noticed a Rotary Wheel on the wall. It was surprising to see the Rotary Wheel and we decided to stay for a drink. After discovering that the owner was a Rotarian we had a good Rotary chat and we presented them with a pin and they gave us their club banner. In addition our drinks were on the house. We would never had expected to have this encounter at Raiatea, Society Islands dockside but that's the magic of the Rotary family.

About: Raiatea is the second largest of the Society Islands, after Tahiti, in French Polynesia. The island is widely regarded as the "centre" of the eastern islands in ancient Polynesia and it is likely that the organised migrations to the Hawaiian Islands, New Zealand and other parts of East Polynesia started at Raiatea.

A traditional name for the island is Havai'i, homeland of the Māori people. Situated on the southeast coast is the historical Taputapuatea marae, which was established by 1000 AD. The site was the political and religious center of eastern Polynesia for several centuries, and was inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List in 2017 for its historical significance.

Raiatea was discovered for Europe by James Cook on July 20, 1769, during his first voyage. Coming from Tahiti, he sailed with the Endeavour through the Avamo'a Reef passage, sacred to the Polynesians, anchored in Opoa Bay and landed near the Marae Taputapuatea. He hoisted the Union Jack and took possession of the island for the British Crown in a brief ceremony.

To expand the Spanish sphere of influence, King Charles III ordered expeditions to the South Pacific. Although neighboring Tahiti was already under the influence of European powers in the late 18th century and formally came under French protectorate in 1842, the clans of Raiatea fiercely resisted annexation efforts. However, Christian missionaries managed to gain increasing influence, which led to religious wars between followers of the traditional and Christian faiths.


Projects which our Rotary E-Club of South Africa One Supports
