Human resources constitute the ultimate basis for the wealth of a nation, and it is therefore vital that a country develops the skills and knowledge of its residents for the greater benefit of all.

I will leave that question with you.



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So it often gets a little too much to remember when, as Rotarians, in our dedicated Rotary months, we also have the various World & UN International Days.

But before we get into giving peace a chance, lets share with you some new beginnings with the very first launch of the StudyBuddy desks to a primary school here in a near rural area inland of Scottburgh.

Although we understand why we have to blank out the children's faces....it's such a pity, as the joy on receiving such a cool learning tool is so clear to see in their expressions...



A huge thank you and congratulations to Rotarian Nessa Rana for her determination to get the StudyBuddy campaign off the ground.

Now E-Club members and friends need to be patient and wait to see how successful this literacy project will be in that community, as we are all aware that it's not just good enough to launch a project....but more importantly to see whether that project is a success. And by "success", we mean that the project is sustainable in the long term with just minimal support from our Rotary club.

Whether a project can become sustainable, relies on a number of factors – most importantly the project must have a Rotarian who "champions" the project and also the project needs to be effectively monitored – at least in the first 6 months to 1 year.

We have no doubt that this first launch of StudyBuddy will be sustainable in the long run for the following reasons:

- ➤ Nessa is the "champion" of this first school.


 Her love of teaching small children the necessary skills in order to become literate is what drives her to do what she does

 - A "champion" has also been allocated at the school (one of the teachers or the school principal) to ensure that the easy-to-learn StudyBuddy system that Nessa has devised, is followed closely.
- Fellow E-Club member Iris Canham, has a very good relationship with the school and the community and has developed such creative monitoring tools. These tools are used to determine whether the StudyBuddy learning system is:
 - being used correctly by the teachers at the school and
 - succeeding ie. to check on how the participating children's literacy skills are improving.

These monitoring tools also ensure the understanding that they, as a school AND a community, are essentially responsible for the success of the programme.

So also thank you to Rotarian Iris for her part in making the launch of the first StudyBuddy project a success in this community.

Ed. received strict instructions from Neil to keep the subject matter/topic of his talk a secret.






Fay is currently the UK coordinator of a global peace organisaton called PEACEJAM.





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
The Rotary clubs of Durban Umhlatuzana, Mtunzini and all the way up there in Parys, had some fun happenings in September.



IN THE SPOTLIGHT is dedicated to bringing awareness to our fellow Rotarians here in SA as well as worldwide, of projects that touch our heart as the E-Club.....but we simply do not currently have the funding to help these deserving organisations.

At the beginning of each new Rotary year, our intrepid Projects Director Logie, alongside President Arlene, our money-lady Brigitte & the rest of the board, assesses our funds situation for the coming year. These funds are then allocated to specific projects – for the entire year. As a result, we do not have extra funds to support any new, bigger, projects that catch our attention during the current Rotary year.

So this part of the Drumbeat is a call to our fellow Rotarians and our Friends of Rotary all around the world, for funding for some very specific projects that "catch our hearts".

FIRST UP is an organisation that we would like to become involved in, as this project would support Rotary's ENVIRONMENT Area of Focus.

We have 12 ECD centres south of Durban in the inland rural area's that we work with through Rotarian Iris Canham.

➤ We will need some garden tools — a few small spades etc. - for maintenance of the buckets by the ECD Centres (price of spades to be confirmed, but approximate cost is +- up to R100.- each).

NEXT UP is a request for funding for the purchase of some learning and educational tools for the Alabaster Box Autiism school in Chatsworth, Durban by the E-Club. The Drumbeat wrote about this in the July & August 2025 editions.

The Alabaster Box Autism is an organisation that has set in motion the start-up of a fully established, no-fee autism school that will offer quality education, therapy services, sensory rooms & skills



development catering to the developmental needs of autistic learners in the Greater Chatworth community.

This is a project that our E-Club member, Rotarian Pree Parumaul is passionate about. On the 22nd August this year, Pree presented the E-Club board with a quote that she had received from a therapy supply store that was approached to supply the needed equipment.






We started this month's Drumbeat with wise words from President Arlene, and now we are parting ways with some "thinking material"....but thankfully, with a positive ending....










And now as we part...firstly some words from the wise....
