The best way to cultivate international understanding is through business and social intercourse," said Paul Harris at the Pacific Rotary Conference in Tokyo, 1928.

Rotary was founded on fellowship, a concept that has been expanded internationally through the Rotary Fellowships groups that bring together members from different countries and cultures to enjoy a shared interest.

In addition to fostering lifelong friendships, Rotary Fellowships keep members active in Rotary, sustaining their interest and further inspiring commitment.

What are the benefits for Rotarians in joining the Rotary Fellowships? Fellowship provides opportunities for Rotarians to make lasting friendships outside their own Club, District or country. Fellowships contribute to the advancement of world understanding and peace. Also, Fellowships serve as an incentive for attracting new members to Rotary and retaining our existing members. Indeed, Rotary Fellowships, together with the Rotarian Action Groups, serve as an effective tool in promoting membership development and should be actively promoted in our Club.

The nearly one hundred Rotary Fellowships encompass a variety of vocations and avocations, ranging from sports and hobbies to professional interests — all of which serve as a way to extend international fellowship, friendship and service.

In addition to offering members an opportunity to share their passion for a particular interest with like-minded Rotarians, many individual fellowship groups enable members to use their hobbies or skills to serve others.

For example, the Fellowship of Canoeing Rotarians has organized clean-ups of polluted rivers.

The oldest fellowship dates back to 1947 when a group of Rotarians who loved sailing began flying the Rotary flag from their boats, calling themselves the International Yachting Fellowship of Rotarians. Today, more than 3,300 Rotarians sail together in one of 109 Rotary fleets in 37 countries!

Invite your friends that you share a similar hobby or interest to join a Fellowship with you. This is a great opportunity to introduce them to Rotary.

Rotary is always adapting and changing to ensure that fun and fellowship remains the most important aspect of Clubs. The versatility of Fellowships is very evident in the recently formed Rotary Fellowship of Metalheads. Have a look at https://metalheadfellowship.org/

Why DEI is the 'right thing' for Rotary

Posted on June 8, 2021

Editor's Note: In September 2020, Rotary formed a taskforce charged with assessing the current status of diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) in Rotary and shaping a comprehensive action plan to help us further value and live those principals throughout the organization. This is the first installment of a series of blog posts from DEI Taskforce members reflecting on their work on the committee and why it is critical for the organization.

Katey Halliday is a past president and founding member of the Adelaide City Rotaract Club, and a member of the Rotary Club of Adelaide Light. She initiated her district's first-ever participation in the local Pride March celebrations and is a member of her Rotaract club's Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) working group. Professionally, she is a diversity and inclusion project officer and training facilitator for South Australia Police (read her full bio). We asked Halliday the following questions about DEI and Rotary.

Q. As a member of Rotary's DEI Taskforce, what do you consider to be some of the unique challenges Rotary faces in examining and taking action to strengthen our DEI practices and mindsets? What do you think is needed to overcome them?

Katey: One of the unique challenges is the size of the organization. Our global cultural differences are another. Club cultures with members who are not working in businesses/organizations working towards DEI, may be out of touch with what is happening and expected in corporate/professional realms in terms of DEI.

Big organizations have been working towards DEI for years. Potential new members who are working in these realms may be put off by a club that is not DEI friendly. Rotary needs to fill this gap by providing the education and awareness that workplaces have been doing and continue to do.

Q: What characteristics, values, or experiences can Rotary draw upon to help us become a model for how organizations embrace and live out the values of diversity, equity, and inclusion?

Katey: Look at what other large (especially global) organizations are doing to be more DEI friendly. This is where working with third-party DEI experts will be valuable. We are certainly not the first (and I imagine there are aspects of our organizational culture where we are quite far behind) which means we can learn a lot from others.

Q: How do you expect that the experiences of our members and others will change once we have strengthened our DEI practices and culture throughout the organization?

Katey: There will be some who are already on board with enhancing diversity, equity, and inclusion throughout our culture and they will feel empowered and energized by the positive changes made. There are some who will not agree and will never change and we must ensure they do not hinder progress. But we cannot focus too much effort trying to change them.

The majority of individuals, however, will be in the "movable middle" and we must get them on board through education and awareness of why it is so important, not only to strengthening Rotary for the future, but because it is the right thing to do for the communities we live in. Some of the "movable middle" will be influenced by data and facts and some will be motivated through stories that promote empathy. Eventually, these people will form part of the majority and become the role models and active bystanders who ensure that anything contrary to a DEI culture we want to build will not be tolerated.

Q: What is one meaningful question that every club should pose among its members to start a productive conversation around DEI?

Katey: Start with why – Why is it important for Rotary to be more diverse, equitable and inclusive?

Q: What other perspectives, priorities or thoughts about DEI do you feel it is important for Rotary members to understand?

Katey: Overcoming unconscious bias and the assumptions people make about others based on their personal characteristics will be important for Rotary members in creating change. We also need to acknowledge that everyone can and should be doing something to create change because it cannot be done by leaders alone. Empowering members with things they can do to create change will be important (bystander actions, awareness of reporting mechanisms, supports, etc.)

I trust you are well. I would like to quickly update you on the impact RAH has made despite these difficult times. RAH has distributed 200 584 meals since 2021, and fed 17 280 beneficiaries. We have two new corporate donors who have committed to supporting our sustainable farming projects. The one will be in KZN and the other in either Limpopo or Gauteng. Despite this formidable impact, the issue of malnutrition and hunger still prevails. I believe this has always been our first pandemic.

The "hunger" virus kills about 8000 children a day and the vaccine for it exists. It's called "food", but you won't hear that in the media because "hunger" doesn't kill the rich.

The RAH & The Diepsloot Farming project is now producing much needed fresh vegetables to some of our ECDs in Diepsloot. Gerald, should you feel that the Rotary Club is able to donate towards our ECD Connect Programme or the Sustainable Farming project, please do not hesitate to contact me.

New Rotary club takes aim at human trafficking

As a teacher, I have heard about children in my school as young as six years old being sexually exploited for money, and I felt powerless to do anything about it. This was happening within families as a business and to support drug habits. Children would be removed from a household for a couple of days but would be placed back again with the same family.

I've also talked to college students who shared their experience of being recruited to "model" or "dance" under the guise of modelling agency or dance studios. Most of the students regardless of age felt ashamed and scared to tell anyone, especially law enforcement.

Cause-based e-club

Human trafficking is a real issue and it is closer to you than you probably think. In the summer of 2019, Patti Mellard called a meeting of Rotary members from several clubs to meet in Topeka to discuss the social injustice of human trafficking and what we could do about it. Two years later, Rotary Club of Community Action Against Human Trafficking (CAAHT) was created and officially chartered on 27 January 2021 as the first cause-based Eclub in Kansas and one of the first in the world focused on eradicating human trafficking.

I am honoured to be the first president of the club. The issue is personal to me. A few years ago, as a member on Law Board for the Riley County Police Department (RCPD), I attended a conference on Human Trafficking and was astonished at how prevalent sex trafficking was in our community and how little was being done about it.

In 2019, as city commissioner, I collaborated with our former mayor, Linda Morse, to work with massage therapists, city staff, district attorney, and RCPD to pass an ordinance called Massage Therapy License to prevent human trafficking. This was unregulated business and some sex traffickers were using this industry for human trafficking. District Attorney Barry Wilkerson wrote a letter about sex trafficking in our community and supporting city legislation to work toward putting an end to it in our community. It is one piece of the solution, but it gave me hope and inspired me to work diligently with individuals and organizations to eradicate human trafficking and sexual exploitation at all levels.

Sex trafficking can target anyone


Human trafficking is a complex issue and is often underreported. Anyone can become a victim regardless of race, socio-economic status, gender, sexual orientation, education or age. Our cause, our mission, is to put an end to human trafficking.

Our club is currently a partner on a global grant application for Reintegrating Survivors of Sexual Exploitation and Sex Trafficking. Patti Mellard from the Rotary Club of Topeka South and Lynette Stassen from the E-Club of Cape town in collaboration with Governor Faron Barr of District 5710, and the Rotary clubs of Leawood, Lenexa, and Melkos plan to provide services, training, resources, mentoring and support to assist survivors at Rended Heart.

I am thrilled to be part of this new journey. Rotarians are **People of Action** and I know this club will act to end human trafficking.







How we grew our club by saying no to domestic violence



Rotary clubs in New South Wales delivered a message against domestic violence during the baton relay event marking 100 years of Rotary in Australia and New Zealand.

If we want to reverse the decline in membership that many clubs have been experiencing the last 10 years, we need to have a cause that engages our members and communities. With this in mind, our Rotary club created a focus group three years ago that searched for an issue that would make a real difference in our community. After careful consideration we decided to adopt a project to address domestic violence and family abuse. Since our involvement in this project, we have grown from 31 members to 76 members.

Australia has had several well-publicized cases of domestic violence in the news and it is a growing social problem. It became obvious to us that this was an issue of vital relevance and one worthy of our primary focus.

Our club closed the main street in our town and conducted peaceful walks to "Break the Silence and End the Violence." We had 800 participants during our initial walk in 2019. We had to take a pause in 2020 because of the pandemic, but are planning another walk on 19 November.

We've also helped negotiate, plan, and fund the delivery of an education program called "Love Bites" in our high schools. The program seeks to teach young people appropriate and respectful actions and attitudes in relationships. It conducts interactive sessions where students can learn about their rights, responsibilities and how they can get help if they find themselves in an abusive relationship.



The club has grown from 31 to 76 members since launching a project to confront domestic violence and family abuse.

We feel that by reaching people at an early age we're helping bring about generational change in attitudes and behaviour.

We also need to take advantage of events and key moments. This year, Australia and New Zealand celebrates 100 years of Rotary in their countries. Our club and some partnering clubs in neighbouring districts had a vision that we could link our 100 years of Rotary Baton Relay event with our project to address domestic violence. The relay offered our members an opportunity to get outside our club meetings and interact with members of our communities on our streets and footpaths, and deliver a firm message of saying No to domestic violence and family abuse. Our advocacy stance generated unprecedented levels of media attention, increasing our relevance and engagement in our communities.

Our club members have a cause that has merit, validity, purpose, and currency. Clubs all around the world can do it too. 

Rotary Peace Poles

It's well known that Peace Building and Conflict Prevention is one of Rotary's Areas of Focus. Rotary Club of Canberra Burley Griffin decided that its centenary project would be to provide a peace pole to 100 schools whose students visited the Canberra Peace Bell.

What is a peace pole? It is either wooden or made of aluminium. It's 5 feet (150cm) in height and has 4 equal sides. One side has the words 'May Peace Prevail on Earth" in English with the same message on the other sides in 3 different foreign languages — these languages being languages taught at the school or spoken by a significant number of families at the school.

An overwhelming response has seen 168 schools now embracing the project.

Points for reflection: this often happens in the workplace. Nobody truly knows which employee actually deserves the merit of success, or who's actually contributing the necessary support to make things happen.


