# How E-Club's Came to be.....Just some Rotary Information.....

While the idea of an eClub may seem new to most Rotarians, RI recognized the potential for Rotarians meeting in an online environment quite some time ago; 2002 to be exact, when Rotary International launched a proof-of-concept pilot project including 14 pilot clubs. After more than an hour of debate, district representatives at the 2010 Council on Legislation voted to make e-clubs a permanent part of Rotary International. The measure was by passed by an overwhelming 430 to 85 vote. Another important outcome of the 2010 Council on Legislation was the decision to allow not one, but two e-clubs per district mainly because of language reasons. This restriction was later removed........

# **President's Perspective**

Good Morning Fellow Rotarians,

First and foremost, I wish you all a very Happy Easter and if you are travelling please take care and be safe.

The theme for March is "Water and Sanitation" and, no doubt, you are aware of the many projects that our Club has done during the past years. With our Project Dignity we have supplied washable and reusable sanitary towels to many underprivileged young girls covering many schools in our District. Alone in Port Alfred, approximately 1800 girls in 8 schools have been beneficiaries of this project. In Natal, both Gerald Sieberhagen and Irene Kotze have been supplying many schools with this product. In addition, Rotary has been approving many grants for the construction of toilets and

water tanks in our District. In Port Alfred, we even managed to raise Euro 90 000 together with our Rotary friends in Lower Saxony and the Bingo Foundation to install 380 water tanks for rainwater harvesting. This was also the first time, I was introduced to WASH-RAG (Water and Sanitation Hygiene Rotary Action Group) <a href="https://www.WASH-RAG.org">www.WASH-RAG.org</a> Have a look at the website, it covers in details why WASH in Health Care Facilities is so important.

Rotarian Ron Denham, Chair Emeritus of the WASH Rotary Action Group, recently created a presentation, which is available as a PowerPoint and a PDF on the topic.

World Water Day was celebrated on March 22nd with the theme "Valuing Water". United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres asks what this means to YOU? According to António Guterres, water means protection. A well-managed Water cycle- encompassing drinking water, sanitation, hygiene, wastewater, transboundary governance, the environment and more – means a defence against ill-health and indignity and a response to challenges from a climate and increasing global demand.

At this moment, 900 million people in the world do not have access to a source of safe water within 1 km of their home; 2.5 billion lack access to adequate

sanitation and 1 in 4 people in the developing world has none.

It is interesting to note that Russia's Lake Baikal and North America's Great Lakes hold about 40% of the world's fresh water supply. The large remainder of the freshwater supply is in the form of icecaps and glaciers, which are under threat due to climate change.

Says António Guterres: "Today, we are not on track to ensure everyone has access to water and sanitation by 2030, as set out in Sustainable Development Goal 6. While advances are being made, current progress needs to quadruple to achieve universal access".

You will be pleased to know that the Rotary Foundation has added "supporting the environment" as the seventh area of focus. More than \$18 million in Foundation global grant funding has been allocated to environment-related projects over the past five years. During our last Board Meeting, it was decided to consider projects falling specifically into this area of focus. Our Club has been involved over the years with environmental projects such as tree planting, vegetable gardens, beach clean ups and many other. Rotary suggests that Clubs consider projects including:

Implementing rainwater harvesting, Building toilets and sanitation systems, Digging wells and drilling boreholes, Building local capacity, changing behaviour or Working with NGOs, CBOs to create self-sufficiency.

I invite you all to submit your comments to our editor what water means to you!!!! You ain't gonna miss your water until your well runs dry - Bob Marley


# President Hans Hon handed over some banners that had been collected recently

# Club banner exchanges showcase local flair, global friendship

One of Rotary's most colourful traditions is members' exchanging club banners. Clubs display their own decorative banners at meetings and district events, and Rotarians who travel to other countries often take these banners to exchange with the clubs they visit. The banners often include symbols or images of a club's town, region, or country. Some represent local cultural traditions or artistry by featuring leatherwork, weaving, embroidery, or hand-painted designs. Many of the banners are works of art in themselves.

Exchanging banners became so popular that the Rotary International Board of Directors was concerned that the practice would place a financial burden on clubs. In 1959, it urged members to "exercise discretion, moderation, and measured judgment in making provision for such exchanges."

Today, the tradition continues as a way for clubs to express their friendship.

The approximately 20,000 banners in Rotary's archives reflect clubs' hometown pride and their connection to Rotary International.

# **FOUNDATION FUNDING UPDATE**

Policy changes to the Rotary Foundation as from 1 July, 2021, that will strengthen the Foundation's ability to fund more global grants.

- The World Fund match of DDF will be reduced from 100% to 80% when being used for global grants.
- DDF contributions transferred to PolioPlus will be matched at 50% instead of 100% by the World Fund.
- 5% of the current year's Annual Fund SHARE Contributions will be taken equally from the World Fund and DDF to help fund operating expenses.
- The ability to roll over unused DDF will be limited to five years. The first DDF rollover will take effect from 1 July, 2026.

NOTE: All of the above changes were taken by the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation because the high demand for global grants is far exceeding and outpacing the growth in Annual Fund contributions, in fact a financial shortfall is expected this year and likely in the coming years because of the growing success of the global grant programme.
